## CANDIDATE FORUM

1. What do you see as the role of Orff Schulwerk in music education today?

Being a hands-on, experiential, playful, creative approach enables the Orff Schulwerk process to fit seamlessly with the many trends in education. Those whom we are teaching, and those for whom we are working, yearn for an environment in which these things take place. Orff Schulwerk covers all the bases and even goes beyond expectations for teaching to the whole child. Part of the magic of the Schulwerk is its ability to adapt and work for many different teaching situations and styles. In an Orff Schulwerk classroom, students learn to think creatively while developing their artistry and musicianship skills. As Liz Gilpatrick said in an article for the Summer 2009 Orff Echo, "We move students past the imitation and replication stage and into the realm of exploring and creating." The result of this Orff process is students who are able to express themselves with a high level of artistry through doing work that is student-centered and not always teacher-driven. How wonderful and exciting to have a classroom where students are not only meeting the core standards but are learning to think critically, creating original ideas for movement and music, and developing their artistry as musicians.

2. What are your leadership strengths, and how do you think they would contribute to the work of AOSA and promoting Orff Schulwerk?

From the first day of my Level I training, I was completely engrossed in this world of Orff Schulwerk and jumped in with both feet.
